Welcome to the spring edition of your *Park Explorer*. In this edition, you will find our 2022 Annual Report to you. The report outlines some of our most prominent accomplishments. It is also a portrayal of our stewardship of the lands, parks and finances that you, our resident taxpayer, have entrusted to us. It is an honor to serve you and our communities.

Your parks have grown to 27 in total, touching virtually every township, city and village. While we have expanded over the years, however, we continue to manage and steward our longtime park resources. This has been the case in recent years with improvements at existing parks. We replaced the lodge at Swine Creek Reservation. We improved trails, foot bridges, scenic overlooks and the playground at Bessie Benner Metzenbaum Park. We steward your finances by remaining aggressive in pursuing state and federal grants that are available for the stewardship of park lands and ecosystems. At Bass Lake Preserve we completed the stream restoration of Beaver Creek. We also restored a section of Spring Brook, home to one of the last viable populations of native brook trout in the State of Ohio.

As an employee of your Park District for more than 29 years, I personally have watched the goal of having a park within 15 minutes of each Geauga resident become a reality. As I have opportunities to network and collaborate with a variety of business, civic and familyoriented initiatives around the county, I often have the privilege of hearing many compliments about the parks and recreational services that Geauga Park District provides. Staff is proud to represent our county with some of the best parks in our business, and honored to present our 2022 Annual Report. We look forward to celebrating with you in the future. Thanks for your confidence in your Geauga Park District.

Big Creek Park was clean and beautiful. Geauga Park District is pleased to welcome two new members to its Board of Park Commissioners: Les LaGatta of Chesterland and Frank Stein of Burton.

The pair joined existing commissioners Howard Bates, Jolene Carnabuci and Ray Guarino at their January meeting to support Geauga Park District's mission: to preserve, conserve and protect the natural features of Geauga County and to provide outdoor recreational experiences to residents of every age, every ability and at all times of the year.

Geauga County Probate/Juvenile Court Judge Timothy J. Grendell named the new commissioners and swore them into office for three-year terms ending Dec. 31, 2025.

Both LaGatta and Stein are 40-year Geauga residents.

LaGatta, a retired 50-year police officer, was a lieutenant commander in Cleveland Heights,





chief-of-police in Chagrin Falls, and a special deputy in Geauga County. He is a veteran of the U.S. Army Reserves and has been married for 42 years, with a blended family of six daughters, all West Geauga grads, and 10 grandchildren. He is currently chaplain and vice president of the Ohio Retired Police Chiefs Association. Stein is a veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps, having proudly served in the Vietnam War. The Baltimore Oriole is a favorite species for many people. Brightly clad in orange, black and white, it sings a pleasing song welcoming spring's return to Geauga County. But where is the oriole when it isn't here?

We only see Baltimore Orioles in spring and summer, so where are they the rest of the year? Orioles are part of a diverse suite of bird species called neotropical migrants that overwinter in central and South America and breed in the United States and Canada, Warblers, vireos, thrushes and hummingbirds are others. But for now, let's follow a Baltimore Oriole journey during the course of a year.

Our story begins in late August, when baby orioles have fledged and are becoming independent. Shortening days trigger a response to start moving south, kicking off a fall migration that takes two or two-anda-half months. By early September, most Baltimore Orioles have shifted west to the Great Plains, south to Texas, and the first birds start to appear in southern Mexico. This shift to Mexico and Central America is rapid throughout September, and by mid-October only a few stragglers remain in Texas. By early November, the fall migration is complete, and all the orioles are on their wintering grounds, from southern Mexico to Columbia and Venezuela.

Once in the tropics, Baltimore Orioles will flock up with other neotropical migrants and some resident birds. These mixed flocks move through the forests together in search of food — which, for our orioles, is nectar, fruit and insects. Other wildlife they may encounter are toucans, parrots, monkeys and sloths: a decidedly



different collection of wildlife than they encounter in Ohio! They will stay on wintering grounds until late April, when spring migration starts, at which point the first few birds will begin reaching Texas.

In the spring, Baltimore Orioles need to migrate thousands of miles, stake out a territory, find a mate, and raise their young. They are motivated to move. Compared to their relatively slow pace in the fall, spring migration only lasts about one month, winding up by late May. In that one month,

they will have moved from central and South America to the northern parts of the United States and southern Canada! June through August, they nest, raise babies, and enjoy our long days of summer. Then, in September, the migration cycle begins again.

It is imperative that neotropical migrants like our Baltimore Oriole have intact habitats on their breeding and winter grounds, and along their migration route. As more lands become developed, these green spaces become oases to birds. Geauga Park District offers excellent stop-over habitat for birds on migration as well as high-quality breeding habitats. This spring, when you see a Baltimore Oriole, possibly on one of our naturalist-led bird walks, take a moment to think about the incredible journey that little bird has experienced!

Create a Simple Spring Tree Painting

You will need: black/brown, blue, red and white craft paint, a brown paper bag (one that is bigger and made of thicker paper), cotton balls, cotton swabs

We'll create one of these for each season in 2023, so by this fall you'll have a set of four to display!











First, take a spring hike to look up at the tree branches. Observe how new leaves and blossoms grow from the branches.

1. Cut a square/rectangle from a big paper bag; it's made of nice, thick paper and often easy to find around the home. Crinkle it up a bit to create some texture in the paper. Use a cotton ball to smear light blue paint from edge to edge for the background. Let dry.

2. With black or brown paint, use a cotton swab to draw a straight, thick line from top to bottom. You can do it right through the center or off to one side Then create a few thick lines diagonally and extend them to the paper's edge. Let dry.

3. Extend some thinner lines out from the diagonal lines. You can even draw some from the main thick vertical line. Let dry.

4. Use the green paint and a cotton swab to dabble dots along the sides of the lines for small spring leaves. You can also take some pink or yellow paint and dabble dots for spring blooms.

5. Finally, let the paint dry completely. If you'd prefer to flatten your painting out, place between two sheets of paper and put inside a thick book.




